




HI's team and areas of intervention

c. Geopolitical analysis

Niger is situated south of the Sahara, in the heart of Africa. The country borders Algeria and Libya to the north, Chad to the east, Nigeria and Benin to the south and Burkina Faso and Mali to the west. Its capital is Niamey. With a surface area of 1,267,000 km2, Niger has three climate zones: the north is dry and arid; the centre is a Sahelian zone with average rainfall; and the south has high rainfall. As a result, the country is prone to both droughts and floods. Niger's economy is largely based on agriculture and the breeding of livestock.

Education is a major challenge in Niger. With one of the highest population growth rates in the world (3.9% per year) and one out of every two citizens under the age of 15, the country still has one of the lowest school enrolment rates in the world, particularly among children with disabilities.

Niger is a landlocked country that tries to maintain good relations with its neighbours, on which it depends for economic exchanges and security. It is a member of many regional organisations (African Union, Economic Community of West African States - ECOWAS, G5 Sahel, Community of Sahel and Saharan States - CEN-SAD, etc.). It is also a member of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation and the International Organisation of La Francophonie. Niger has often played a role in the resolution of crises, both in the region and beyond, sending troops to Côte d'Ivoire as part of the UN mandate from 2004 to 2015, and later to the Central African Republic, Haiti and Mali. Owing to its relative stability, its numerous land borders and its links with North Africa, Niger has also assumed important responsibilities in recent years in the fight against terrorism in the Sahel and in the asylum and protection of refugees of various nationalities. It has seen successive and significant waves of population displacement in recent years.

As it borders Mali, Chad, and Nigeria, Niger is exposed to the security tensions of its neighbours and to incursions by non-state armed groups into its territory. In 2019 and 2020, the security situation greatly and constantly deteriorated, with an intensification of attacks by non-state armed groups.

People with disabilities are highly stigmatised in Niger. According to popular perceptions and representations, disability is generally assimilated to incapacity and deficiency. The negative perceptions and attitudes perpetuated by families and communities remain the biggest obstacle to the successful social inclusion of people with disabilities. Many families use their children with disabilities to bring in money from begging, thus depriving them of their right to education and training. Another phenomenon is the "use" of children of people with disabilities and children from poor families as begging guides, keeping families in perpetual poverty and ensuring a lack of prospects for these children and adolescents.



Summary of HI's work in the country

In May 2006, after carrying out an exploratory mission and preparing two projects (a pilot education project and a project on disability and citizenship), HI opened an office in Niamey. The organisation was registered in 2007 and a framework agreement signed with the Niger State Government. Subsequently, two regional projects were developed, in 2008 and 2012.

The organisation's field of intervention began to expand in 2012 with a food security and a resilience and armed violence reduction project in Agadez, and then in 2015 with the project to prevent and reduce the risk of complications and disabling after-effects in children under five suffering from malnutrition or delayed development. In 2016, a new project updated the training programme for physical therapists in the country and provided training materials to the Niger Physical Therapists Association

In 2017, after conducting a study to evaluate the effectiveness of computer modelling and 3D printing of prostheses, HI fitted its first patients as part of the regional IMPACT 3D project. Between 2015 and 2021, HI also developed a project to assist urban refugees and asylum seekers in the city of Niamey. Actions aimed at protecting populations living near stocks of weapons and ammunition were deployed in partnership with the National Commission for the Collection and Control of Illicit Weapons, from 2014 to 2021.

HI is currently supporting vulnerable populations in Niger (people with disabilities affected by humanitarian responses in Diffa, and Maradi) and is carrying out inclusion support actions centrally, in different clusters and working groups. In 2021, in response to the protection needs of populations in conflict-affected areas, HI launched two projects on explosive ordnance risk education and the prevention of multiple violations affecting vulnerable populations.

Through its inclusive education project, the organisation helps children with disabilities to access and remain in primary education. HI has collaborated with FNPH to implement a project to promote the social and legal inclusion of women and children with disabilities in Niger. Since the end of 2019, HI has been implementing a project to strengthen the resilience and social cohesion of vulnerable populations in cross-border regions. Despite the COVID-19 crisis, HI has been able to adapt its ongoing activities to meet the needs of the vulnerable population.
